Manager's Report:

Helpful Recycling Information for Owners.

Did you know that regular alkaline batteries  can be thrown in the garbage but fluorescent light bulbs  cannot? Standard batteries, such as AA, AAA or any other standard alkaline batteries contain no mercury however; rechargeable batteries do! We will be placing a drop box for these types of batteries in the clubhouse at the beginning of July. Fluorescent light bulbs must be recycled. Local area companies charge a fee for this service typically, \$.48 cents for each compact bulbs and approximately \$.11 cents per foot for tubes. I will be working with Battery Plus to obtain a recycling box for the tubes and will place it in the garbage closet located in the clubhouse. Again, this should be in place by the beginning of July so keep your eye out for a notice stating the recycling program has begun!

Where to Place those Oversized Items for Garbage Pick Up?

If you have any oversized items such as Television sets, mattress', side tables, old chairs, etc., they should be placed outside of the garbage surround located between building 9 & 10. Please do not place oversized items in the garbage rooms of the river buildings or between the garages of building 5 & 6 as Waste Management will not pick these up. Waste Management has worked out a plan to only pick up these oversized items at the 9 & 10 surround. If you have renovations done in your unit, the contractor should be responsible for removing any debris.

Berry Angel Delight

- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 cups vanilla yogurt (from three 6-ounce containers)
- 1 round angel food cake (8 inches in diameter) cut or broken into one-inch pieces
- 1 cup fresh (or frozen) blueberries
- 1 cup quartered fresh (or frozen) strawberries
- 1 cup fresh (or frozen) raspberries

1. In chilled medium bowl, beat whipping cream and sugar with electric mixer on high speed until stiff peaks form. Gently stir in yogurt.
2. Place cake pieces in large bowl; gently stir in yogurt mixture. In medium bowl, gently mix berries.
3. Spoon half of the cake mixture into a 9-inch springform pan. Press firmly in pan with rubber spatula. Top with half of the berries. Repeat with remaining cake mixture. Press with spatula. Cover and refrigerate at least 4 hours or overnight. Top with berries.
4. Run metal spatula carefully along side of dessert to loosen; remove side of pan. Cut dessert into wedges and serve.

Fire Symbols on Buildings



Did you ever wonder what the red **R** symbol on each building represents?

Florida Regulations in conjunction with the Fire Fighter Safety Building Marking System require the placement of an identifying symbol on structures constructed with light weight frame truss (wood or light gauge steel roof trusses) to warn fire fighters or emergency responders of the construction of the structure.

Trusses can fail quickly when heated-sometimes as quickly as less than 10 minutes. Fire fighters that see the mandated sign on buildings will adjust their method of fighting the fire to best assure the safety of the responders.

The signs on the buildings at Harbor Isles Phase 1 are marked with the letter **R** indicating the type of roof framing. The floors of the condos are concrete. If the floors were of wood construction, the symbol **RF** could be on the building.

Fire Alarm Bell

When a fire alarm bell sounds, everyone should leave the building until it is checked by the Fire Department.

Fire safety is everyone's responsibility.

Hurricane Preparedness Kits

Hurricane season is here once again, so it's a good time to plan in advance how to be prepared in case we are in a storm's "line of fire".

It is important to create a kit of supplies that you could take with you if you are forced to evacuate. This kit will also be useful if you are able to stay in your home, but are still affected by the storm, such as through the loss of power. However, if you prepare your kit ahead of time, you can alleviate a lot of the potential stress of a very chaotic situation.

You should create your kit in a bag that you can easily take with you. Some recommended items to include are:

- Non-perishable food (enough to last at least 3 days)
- Water (enough to last at least 3 days)
- First-aid kit (include any prescription medication you may need)
- Personal hygiene items and sanitation items
- Flashlights (have extra batteries on hand)
- Battery operated radio (again, have extra batteries)
- Waterproof container with cash and important documents
- Manual can opener
- Lighter or matches
- Books, magazines, games for recreation
- Pet supplies and baby supplies if applicable
- Cooler and ice packs
- A full tank of gas in your vehicle
- A plan for evacuation and a plan to reunite if family members become separated
- Cash on hand as ATM machines may not be working
